Biography

Ross Davies joined RGC in the summer of 2016 and went on to become the mainstay of their front row in a season where the Gogs made history in making the Premiership Tier 1 Playoffs and winning the National Cup for the 1st time despite being rank outsiders. In a rarity for a tight head prop Davies scored the winning try at Cardiff's Principality Stadium as cup kings Pontypridd were beaten 15-11.

A very strong scrummager with a carrying game to go with it, previous to this Davies spent 3 seasons in the set piece dominated English Championship with firstly Rotherham Titans and then Doncaster Knights becoming an asset to both teams.

Ross had previously gained Guinness Premiership and Rabo Pro 12 experience with Sale Sharks and the Ospreys as well as being only the second ever player from the village Trinant (after Haydn Morgan – British Lion) to play for the Barbarians in 2011.

Having grown up in the valleys of South Wales, Ross played all his age grade rugby for Newbridge RFC before going on to gain schoolboy international honours for Wales u18 in 2002 and then again a year later for Wales u19 playing in both the 6 Nations and World Cup before going on to be part of the 2005 Wales u21 Grand Slam winning squad.
